Film Review HUM 120: Film in American Culture (Fall 2005)

Watch a contemporary film and write a review. The film must be one released in American theatres during 2004 or 2005. You must watch the complete movie, so televised films will not usually qualify for this assignment. The text of your review should be between 300 and 500 words.

Your review might answer the following:

- Where can the film be viewed? Is it in theatres, on DVD, etc?
- When did the film open in theaters or become available for rental?
- Who are the major actors?
- Who directed the film? What other films has this person directed?
- What is the film's genre?
- How long is the film?
- Who is the film's intended Audience? What is the film's rating?
- What is the plot?
- What films are similar? How is this film unique?
- Would you recommend the film? If so, to whom?

Film Review Rubric HUM 120: Film in American Culture (Fall 2005)

A (100%)

The review contains a good introduction, body and conclusion. Writing is succinct, articulate, interesting, and informative. The review provides enough information for the reader to determine their own interest in viewing the film. The review does not 'spoil' the film. The review meets professional expectations.

A- (90%)

The review is of good quality, but is below the highest standards. Writing is succinct, accurate and articulate, but may lack the detail or perspective needed for readers to make informed decisions.

B (80%)

Grammar and spelling are below professional standards (e.g., obvious spelling errors, use of homonyms, etc.). The review is only moderately helpful to the reader or otherwise fails to meet the standards for an A.

C (70%)

The review appears superficial and lackluster. Writing has a few notable problems by lacking clarity, brevity and/or accuracy. The review has minimal value for the reader. Grammar and spelling fail to demonstrate careful editing (e.g., sentence fragment, confusing structure, run-on sentence, etc.).

D (60%)

Writing demonstrates lack of editing. The review fails to provide adequate information to readers. Only minimal reflection on the film is demonstrated by the review.

Throughout the semester, discussion questions will be posted on the turnitin.com website. At the minimum, you are expected to make a thoughtful, articulate, insightful response to each question. Additionally, you should be willing to respond to the comments of your classmates. Do not feel that you must respond to every, or even most, posts by other students. Respond to those posts for which you feel you have something valuable to add to the discussion. You may agree, disagree, or expand on the posts of other students. And feel free to respond to comments made responding to you. This is a "discussion" board and discussions involve a cycle of communication. You must make your first response to each question by the due date specified in the syllabus. You may, however, continue the discussions throughout the semester.

Your grade for the discussions will be a summative evaluation of your overall participation in the discussions. The evaluation will be made according to the following criteria:

- **A (100%)** → The student's responses to discussion questions were consistently thoughtful, articulate and insightful. The student carried on excellent discussions as appropriate. Discussions were consistently conducted with professionalism. The discussions added to the course atmosphere.

During the semester, you may write a film review for submission to the Webber *Warrior* student newspaper. If your review is accepted for publication by the *Warrior* advisor, you will receive 2 points extra credit. You may submit as many reviews as you would like to submit, but you may receive credit for only two reviews published during the semester. These reviews may not be the same as the reviews submitted as class assignments.

The film you review must be a film recently released and currently in American theaters. Your review should be between 450 and 500 words. The review should be targeted toward the audience of the *Warrior* newspaper.
